we are gathered here—in front of God & everybody—to create a moment together. in doing so, you are free to sway in your seat, gasp, laugh, cry, offer an "amen" or a "that's right!" or a "mmph," should the music or the spirit move you. while walking in this freedom, please keep in mind that the actors have come to tell a story & the audience has come to hear & watch this story. consider using a range of vocalization. remember, ain't no harm to moan.

you are free to bear collective witness & be collectively witnessed.

after all, this is the nature of a jook joint & one of the purposes of church, of community.

you are free of judgement. here, we abolish the culture of policing. be free to bring your full self into this space & accept that everyone else here is free to do the same.

WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST

THE PUBLIC THEATER continues the work of its visionary founder Joe Papp as a civic institution engaging, both on stage and off, with some of the most important ideas and social issues of today. Conceived over 60 years ago as one of the nation's first nonprofit theaters, The Public has long operated on the principles that theater is an essential cultural force and that art and culture belong to everyone. To know Erika Dickerson-Despenza is to know that the future of theater is in great hands. Her voice is a wondrous and piercing light in dark times, reminding us with gorgeous clarity that our art form is as much a way to commune as it is a spur toward revolutionary justice. CULLUD WATTAH is only one example of her astonishing talent, a play that is unmistakably contemporary yet also deeply rooted in generations of radical Black art. And so, it feels not only appropriate but inevitable that CULLUD WATTAH should have its world premiere at the same theater that Ntozake Shange blessed with for colored girls... in 1976.

You are about to meet Marion, Ainee, Big Ma, Reesee, and Plum, a family of Black women living during the water crisis in Flint, Michigan, which began on April 25, 2014, and is still not fully resolved. We hope that you value your time with these characters as much as we do. And we also hope that you will leave this theater knowing that what happened in Flint is not unique to any time or place. The bones of this country were built with lead pipes, pipes that have leeched poison into the drinking water of Flint, D.C., Newark, and many, many other communities.

The people of Flint organized and fought for their community and for their health. Other cities around the country are facing the same tragedy, and everywhere there are people rising up to demand safe drinking water from their government. These movements are part of larger movements demanding that we protect our environment, demanding that the government serve all its citizens, and not just the corporations and profiteers. This is a beautiful and powerful play, but its most powerful impact can only come if you are moved to join in solidarity with those movements. We hope you will.

Candis C. Jones has long been a brilliant leader in The Public's community, and she has assembled an extraordinary cast and creative team to bring this play to life. Candis has been working with Erika since the beginning of their professional lives, and they've formed a powerful partnership. We hope you can feel the warmth, joy, and sense of collective purpose that filled their rehearsal room every day.

Together, let us all stand with Flint and every community in America who has been denied the most essential resource on earth. You can find a list of individuals and organizations who are fighting for water justice across the country on our website. We hope that you'll join us in supporting them however we can.

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Live and In Stereo

Six must-own live albums from Broadway's biggest stars

Theatre is an inherently live art form, so it's no surprise that our favorite Broadway stars often shine brightest in front of an audience. Here, in no particular order, are some of the best live albums recorded by Broadway stars.



Patti LuPone: Live: Released in 1993, this album was LuPone's first solo album, live or otherwise. She had, of course, by then already established herself as a true Broadway star, and this two-disc album allows her to cover a lot of territory, ranging from pop songs to the major roles (*Evita, Les Misérables*) from her career up to that point.



Betty Buckley: This self-titled album, recorded in 1984 at Saint Bartholomew's Church in New York City, finds Buckley's nearly unprecedented and signature rafter-reaching belt in top form. She doesn't really pull from her career, but what she does choose to sing is impressive regardless. Standouts include "Meadowlark," "The Wind Beneath My Wings" (four years before Bette Midler sang it), and "Dark Blue-Eyed Blues," the latter of which Buckley co-wrote with Lyle Mays.



Barbara Cook At Carnegie Hall: This 1975 album was a comeback of sorts for Barbara Cook, who, in 1975 when the album was recorded, was in a career slump after originating leading roles in *The Music Man* and *She Loves Me*. Cook revisits her major Broadway roles, and the success of this concert and accompanying album launched Cook as one of the major cabaret performers of the last half-century.



Sondheim, Etc: Bernadette Peters Live at Carnegie Hall: Closely associated with composer Stephen Sondheim after creating the roles of Dot in Sunday in the Park with George and The Witch in Into the Woods, Peters focused on the Sondheim songbook when planning her 1996 Carnegie Hall concert. She covers some of her non-Sondheim career as well, with "Time Heals Everything," "Raining in My Heart," and "Making Love Alone."



A Happening in Central Park: Recorded in 1967—three years after she opened Funny Girl on Broadway and a year before the film would be released—A Happening in Central Park captures Barbra Streisand early in her career and at her best. She is in fantastic voice singing songs like "I Can See It," "People," and "Happy Days Are Here Again." If you want more, there's a DVD of the concert that offers some performances not included on the original album.



Merman in Vegas: When this album was recorded at the Flamingo Hotel in 1962, Ethel Merman was at the height of her fame as the Queen of Broadway. Merman mostly sticks to her hits, but it's interesting to hear her covering songs like *Bye Bye Birdie*'s "A Lot of Livin' to Do" as well. This is a fascinating glimpse at one of Broadway's biggest stars in front of an audience.
