Dear Friends,

In many ways, GATZ was the first choice I made when I came to The Public Theater. I finished my contract negotiations in December of 2004 and began work in January of 2005, while I was still living in Providence, Rhode Island. In the first weeks of January, I drove in to see the first edition of the Under the Radar Festival, Mark Russell's wonderful gathering that I then invited to the Public Theater where we happily worked together for a couple of decades.

As part of the Festival that year, I saw an "underground" showing of the second half of GATZ at The Performing Garage on Wooster Street. Elevator Repair Service was still in the midst of working out the rights with the Fitzgerald estate, as at that time *The Great Gatsby* was still under copyright; it isn't anymore, which is why you are seeing this explosion of *Gatsby* adaptations around the country.

The production was thrilling, even in its early, incomplete form. Talking to John Collins afterwards, I told him he must bring it to The Public. It was the start of a relationship that has seen ERS become an ongoing part of The Public's family, and to GATZ making multiple sold-out appearances at the Public.

Now it is returning to The Public for the final time; John has said it will likely not be performed in New York City again after this.

Every time I see GATZ (and I have seen it at least seven times, despite its length), I float out of the theater, exhilarated and joyous, under the illusion that Gatsby is the greatest American novel. Within a couple of days, I return to earth and remember *Moby Dick*, but the exhilaration lasts longer. Why is this? It is certainly true that *The Great Gatsby* is a very great novel, and it is wonderful to encounter it again, but that can't fully explain the power of GATZ.

Because GATZ unleashes not only the power of the novel, but the power of the theater. The simple but powerful setting that Elevator Repair Service has created serves as a deep counterpoint to Jay Gatsby's American Dream. The unique and brilliant acting of the troupe, narrative and dramatic at the same time, brings complex performance riches to the text; the act of hearing the text in a theater, surrounded by other audience members, transforms the fundamentally private act of reading into a deep communal experience. GATZ combines the virtues of great literature and great theater, and the result is breathtaking.

Thanks to John Collins and the whole Elevator Repair Service company for blessing The Public with this masterpiece, for the final run in NYC.

ELEVATOR REPAIR SERVICE (ERS) is a New York City-based company that creates original works for live theatre with an ongoing ensemble. The company's shows are created from a wide range of texts that include found transcripts of trials and debates, literature,



classical dramas and new plays. Founded in 1991, ERS has created an extensive body of work that includes upwards of 20 original pieces. These have earned the company a loyal following and made it one of New York's most highly acclaimed experimental theatre companies. ERS has received numerous awards and distinctions, including Lortel Awards, a Bessie Award and an Obie Award for Sustained Excellence, as well as a Guggenheim Fellowship and Doris Duke Performing Artist Award for Artistic Director John Collins.

THE PUBLIC continues the work of its visionary founder Joe Papp as a civic institution engaging, both on stage and off, with some of the most important ideas and social issues of today. Conceived over 60 years ago as one of the nation's first nonprofit theatres, The Public has long operated on the principles that theatre is an essential cultural force and that art and culture belong to everyone. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Oskar Eustis and Executive Director Patrick Willingham, The Public's wide breadth of programming includes an annual season of new work at its landmark home at Astor Place, Free Shakespeare in the Park at The Delacorte Theater in Central Park, the Mobile Unit touring throughout New York City's five boroughs, Public Lab, Public Works, Public Shakespeare Initiative and Joe's Pub. Since premiering Hair in 1967, The Public continues to create the canon of American theatre and is currently represented on Broadway by the Tony Award-winning musicals Hamilton by Lin-Manuel Miranda, Suffs by Shaina Taub and Hell's Kitchen by Alicia Keys and Kristoffer Diaz. Their programs and productions can also be seen regionally across the country and around the world. The Public has received 64 Tony Awards, 194 Obie Awards, 62 Drama Desk Awards, 61 Lortel Awards, 36 Outer Critic Circle Awards, 13 New York Drama Critics' Circle Awards, 65 AUDELCO Awards, 6 Antonyo Awards and 6 Pulitzer Prizes.

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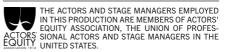
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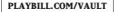
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Thank you for coming to see this encore of GATZ in New York City. These performances follow an incredible run that began in a little garage in Williamsburg in 2004, proceeded to a secret set of "open rehearsals" in a Manhattan garage, and went on to circle the globe. ERS has had the enormous privilege of presenting this unlikely show in cities as far flung as Singapore and Sydney and across the US, including its American premiere at The Walker Art Center in Minneapolis in 2006.

But New York is ERS's home, and GATZ's home in New York (aside from a special 2-week stint at NYU Skirball in 2019) has been The Public Theater. From the moment Oskar Eustis

In 2019) has been ine Public inearter. From the moment Oskar Eustis finished watching an early incarnation at The Performing Garage in 2005, he and The Public have been this show's champions. For five years, Oskar fought hard to help us get the rights to perform the novel in New York. When we finally got the go-ahead, The Public took great care to see that the show got the support and the audience it deserved. And it did—so much so that we had to bring it back the very next season for another packed run. And now we are tremendously grateful to return once again—this time to celebrate the novel's upcoming 100th birthday.

GATZ transformed Elevator Repair Service—it introduced a scrappy off-off-Broadway company to the world and gave us an opportunity to grow as an organization and as an ensemble, bringing in many artists who have been with us since. Over the past two decades, more than 50 ERS artists helped perform, design, and produce the show. **The success of GATZ was a revelation for us and opened our minds to the theatrical potential of literature**, leading us to other projects that have become important parts of our body of work, like The Sound and the Fury and The Select (The Sun Also Rises).

This past summer, almost exactly 20 years after an audience caught its first glimpse of GATZ, we premiered *Ulysses*— our latest foray into 20th Century literature— at The Fisher Center at Bard. It's our head-on collision with James Joyce's immense, delirious, and perplexing masterpiece. Keep an eye out for that show's NYC premiere, coming soon.

But for today, please enjoy the entirety of F. Scott Fitzgerald's great gem of a novel.

THE THEATRE LOVERS' GUIDE TO FILM AND TELEVISION THIS MONTH

t's almost time to gather with our loved ones for the first of many holiday dinners. And what better thing to do after a big meal than watching one of these films led by and created by theatre folks?

On November 8, Netflix will release its screen adaptation of August Wilson's The Piano Lesson. This new film reunites the cast of the 2022 Broadway revival, including Samuel L. Jackson, John David Washington, Ray Fisher, and Michael Potts. The film also stars Skylar Aleece Smith, Danielle Deadwyler, Corey Hawkins (of Topdog/Underdog), with a cameo from Erykah Badu. It is directed by Washington's brother Malcolm Washington, who helped adapt the screenplay with Virgil Williams. The Piano Lesson follows a Black family living in 1936 who must decide whether or not to sell their heirloom piano to buy the land on which their ancestors were enslaved. The film will be released in select theatres November 8 and will be available to stream November 22.

The most anticipated release in November is the long-awaited *Wicked* film, based on the Broadway musical. This first part, of a two-part film, releases November 22 in theatres. It stars Tony winner Cynthia Erivo as Elphaba and pop star/former theatre kid Ariana Grande as Glinda, along with Olivier winner Jonathan Bailey as Fiyero, *SpongeBob SquarePants* star Ethan Slater as Boq, Emmy winner Peter Dinklage as Dr. Dillamond, Oscar winner Michelle Yeoh as Madame Morrible, Jeff Goldblum as The Wizard, Keala Settle as Miss Coddle, and newcomer Marissa Bode as Nessarose, the first wheelchair-using actor in the musical's history to take on the role. With a reported running time of 2 hours and 40 minutes ending with "Defying Gravity," if your favorite part of *Wicked* was the Shiz portion, you're in luck.

That's not the only movie musical being released this month! Also on November 22, Netflix will release *Spellbound* onto its streaming platform. This new animated musical features songs by Broadway legend Alan Menken and Glenn Slater. The film follows a young girl named Ellian (voiced by *Romeo* + *Juliet*'s Rachel Zegler, see page 20) who must go on a quest to break a spell that's turned her parents into monsters. The film also features Nicole Kidman, Javier Bardem, John Lithgow, Jenifer Lewis, Nathan Lane, and Tituss Burgess.

The third movie musical being released this month is *Moana 2* from Disney (not to be confused with the upcoming live adaptation of the first *Moana* film). Three years after the events of the first film, Moana must once again journey out to the ocean to heal an ancient island that's held under a curse. Auli'i Cravalho (of *Cabaret*, see page 16) returns to voice Moana, as well as Dwayne Johnson as Maui. Nicole Scherzinger (of *Sunset Boulevard*) also voices Moana's mother. The film features music by Grammy winners Abigail Barlow and Emily Bear (of *The Unofficial Bridgerton Musical*). *Moana 2* will be released in theatres November 27.
